

Cathedral Floor

Fact File: There has been a Cathedral on this site for more than 1400 years. The Cathedral you are standing in is the fourth or fifth Cathedral; we think that the other Cathedrals all burned down. The previous Cathedral was destroyed in the Great Fire of London in 1666. The Great Fire started in a bakery in Pudding Lane on Sunday 2nd September and lasted for four days. More than 13,000 homes were destroyed as well as 87 parish churches.



2 JOHN DONNE MEMORIAL

John Donne was the Dean of St Paul's from 1621 until his death in 1631. He modelled for this memorial statue. We don't know how it survived the Great Fire. Maybe it crashed through to the crypt and was buried in the books that were stored there!

3 PRE-

PRE-FIRE STATUES

Pre-Fire St Paul's had lots of tombs and monuments to remember important people who had died. Many of these memorials had statues of the people on top. Lots of these were completely destroyed in the fire, but some survived and they are in the crypt.

Clothing. The clothes the statues are wearing are Elizabethan. Some of them have ruffs around the neck, which were very fashionable in the 1500s.



Missing Limbs. The air bubbles inside the stone got so hot that the limbs exploded.

Black in Colour. The heat of the flames turned the stone black.

CAN YOU... FIND? In the crypt you will see the models of both the pre-Fire St Paul's and the present day St Paul's. Look at them closely.






can you hear? What can you smell?

6 SOUTHTRANSEPT

Walk across the road towards the Millennium Bridge (over the River Thames) and look up. Can you see me carved into stone above the South Transept? Below me there is a Latin word RESURGAM. It means 'I shall rise again'. I am a phoenix that rises from the ashes, just like this magnificent building rose from the ashes of the pre-Fire Cathedral.




CAN YOU... COLOUR? Here is a drawing of me rising from the ashes for you to colour in.
